From Pastor Knill's Desk A CATECHETICAL LENT

There are always a variety of options provided by those who prepare Lenten "packages" for churches to use. I was surprised at our January Worship Team meeting when Team members, on reviewing the available options, selected the Catechism as the theme for our six Midweek Lenten services this year. One member commented about having considered attending an Adult Membership Instruction series as a catechism review and finding this series as a possible way to meet that need. I have looked at the sermon resources provided and found them pretty basic. What I have committed to do is take each of the Six Chief Parts of Christian Doctrine, as presented in the Catechism and develop sermons that address the basics but also take us deeper in ways appropriate for the Lenten Season. We will reflect on how the teaching from God's Word in each of the Six Chief Parts will help us examine our life before God, an examination that will clearly show our need for a Savior and will help us marvel at His grace in providing that Savior for the whole world, His Son, Jesus Christ. The liturgy for each Wednesday after Ash Wednesday will be the order of Vespers.

PAMPHLET CATECHISMS HANDED OUT TO PREPARE FOR LENTEN SERVICES

We will hand out sixteen-page catechisms in advance of this year’s Lenten Midweek Series, to help everyone prepare their thinking for more meaningful participation in these services. The catechisms will also be good for midweek meditation and review. The back page of this catechism also contains Luther’s Morning and Evening Prayers. The pamphlet is the 1943 translation of the catechism (the only version available in this format), so the language is not always contemporary, but the thought remains clear.

WHY ASHES ON ASH WEDNESDAY?

After Adam and Eve succumbed to the Tempter’s voice in the Garden of Eden and so joined Satan in His rebellion against their loving Creator, God gave them a taste of what it meant that they had disobeyed and eaten the fruit from the one tree that had been forbidden to them. Among other things (you can read it all in Genesis 3:16-19), God said to Adam that he would (now) return to the ground from which he had been taken: “for you are dust, and to dust you shall return.” The ashes of Ash Wednesday remind us of the curse of sin and our desperate need for a Savior, whom God, by His unfathomable grace, has provided, in Jesus.

For Your Health - From the Parish Nurse

SHINGLES

A good friend of mine was recently diagnosed with shingles. Needless to say, she is miserable and had no idea she even had the condition except for the pain it caused. Many people are unaware that a previous chicken pox infection can cause shingles to develop later in life. This can develop because the virus that causes chicken pox, varicella zoster, rests dormant in the body's nerves permanently after active infection. For some unknown reason, the body allows this virus to reactivate in one of every three adults after the age of 50. The risk of shingles increases with age, although those with compromised immune systems, and those receiving immunosuppressive drugs, are at greater risk.

Shingles often starts as a rash with blisters that are painful. The rash usually occurs on one side of the body or face. While the blisters scab over after 3-5 days, the rash can last from 2-4 weeks. Post-herpetic neuralgia (PHN) is a serious complication that can occur in one of every five people who develop shingles. This condition is more severe and longer lasting than regular shingles, and can last for months or years.

If you develop shingles like my friend did recently, it is important to see your doctor and **start antiviral medication within 24-72 hours after the rash appears.** Fortunately, there are several antiviral medications available that limit the severity and length of time shingles lasts. If you haven't yet developed shingles, you may want to consider the one time injection of the live but weakened vaccine for people 60 years and older as recommended by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC). The vaccine was licensed by Merck Pharmaceuticals in May 2006, and was shown to reduce the risk of getting shingles by 50% in clinical trials. However, certain people should not get the vaccine, such as those allergic to neomycin, those having a weakened immune system, and those with untreated tuberculosis. Medicare Part D covers the cost of the shingles vaccine, but some private insurers do not. At a cost of \$160, it is best to check with your health care provider prior to getting the vaccine.

February is National Heart Month, a time when each of us is reminded that heart disease remains the number one cause of death in the US. It is known as the silent killer since its symptoms are vague and often ignored. Information on heart disease, what it is and how you can reduce your risk, will be available during the month of February in the health and wellness area. Blood Pressure checks will be available after church service in the Fellowship Hall February 12 and February 19. “BIBLE STICK” PROJECT A WAY TO HELP THOSE IN THE ARMED FORCES

During Lent we will advertise a way anyone can help make an audio version of the New Testament available for members of the Armed Forces. The “Bible Stick Project” is a non-profit effort to provide these “sticks,” which a member of the armed forces can hang around his or her neck and listen to the Bible through supplied ear buds. According to the Bible Stick people, more than 100,000 of these sticks have been distributed, only through chaplain’s offices. The cost is \$25 each. Our Mission Team is working with the military Bible Stick department of the Faith Comes by Hearing organization. We will make more information available through the season of Lent. 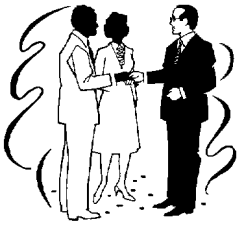
2012 FLOWER CHART

TIPS FOR WELCOMING VISITORS

1. Pray for opportunities to meet and welcome visitors.
2. Look for unfamiliar faces as you pass through the narthex on the way into the sanctuary. Intentionally extend your hand in greeting, give your name and offer a word of welcome.
3. If you see someone who seems unfamiliar with the service, you can show how to stand for the processional hymn, follow the service in the worship folder, use the hymnal, go to the altar for communion, return afterward, and stand for the recessional hymn.
4. After the service, introduce yourself, if you haven't already done so, and invite visitors to come downstairs to the Fellowship Hall for refreshments.
5. Engage visitors in friendly conversation where you show an interest in them: learn about their family, where they live, where they were before they moved here, what they do for a living, etc. Don't initiate a lot of conversation about yourself. When talking about the church, say why you like it here. Especially if they have children, talk about Sunday School. Also be ready to mention the Adult Class. Let visitors take most of the lead in learning about the church. What they learn at their pace and on the basis of their interest is more likely to be meaningful to them.
6. Introduce them to others.
7. Invite them to return.
8. Pray with thanks for the contacts you had, and that God will bless our visitors.

INFORMATION FROM THE JANUARY 22 LEADER TEAM MEETING

(See the minutes for a more complete report.)

Faith in Action: The Food and Clothing Ministry offers groceries, clothing and pet food in the Ark for an average of 75 families per week. There are also some home deliveries. More than 50 children received toys at Christmas. The Team also makes hospital and nursing home visits and provides transportation for services and for Food Ministry volunteers.

Training Team: The Team is tailor-making Sunday School sessions for the small number of students who are currently attending.

Worship Team: The Midweek Lenten Series will focus on the Catechism. We will hand out palm crosses at the beginning of Lent to serve as a visual reminder of the season for families.

Pastoral Care: Fellowship events in the coming weeks will include Soup & Sandwich Suppers during Lent, and a possible Pasta Cook-off, sometime after Easter.

Administrative Team: Exit lights with a battery-powered backup system were installed throughout the main building. The Team has employed a part-time maintenance man to perform projects such as this. A replacement supplemental printer should be in place soon. Pre-Easter work days are planned for March 17, 24 and 31. The Teams have spent approximately 32% of their budgets through the first third of the fiscal year.

LITURGICAL THEMES FOR THE MONTH

FEBRUARY 5 Pastor John preaches. The Gospel is about Jesus' ministry of preaching, teaching and healing, including Peter's mother-in-law (yes, Peter was married).

FEBRUARY 12 Pastor John preaches. The Gospel is about a grateful leper, whom Jesus not only touched, but also healed, and who could not contain himself from telling others what Jesus had done for him.

FEBRUARY 19 The Transfiguration of Jesus gives us a "Glimpse into Glory." It was also Jesus' opportunity to prepare the disciples for His suffering and death, hardly a theology of glory.

FEBRUARY 26 On the First Sunday in Lent, we are encouraged by James, Jesus' half-brother, to remain faithful through times of temptation - just as Jesus was during His temptation by the devil in the wilderness.

DID YOU KNOW . . .

. . . that the Worship Team surprised Pastor Knill with a cake during its meeting on his birthday?

. . . that we will observe Lutheran Hour Sunday on February 5? The Lutheran Hour is the longest-running radio devotional program. It continues to be heard around the world each week. It is funded solely by contributions, so please consider offering your own financial support.

. . . that we will carry the Alleluia banner out of the sanctuary at the close of the service the Sunday before Lent? We put the Alleluia (Praise God!) aside through the Lenten Season, to be brought back with joy on Easter Sunday (April 8).

. . . that we will hand out crosses made from palm fronds at the beginning of Lent as a visual aid for our Lenten concentration?

. . . that there will be a series of Saturday Work Days in March (17, 24, 31) to help us prepare for Easter?

. . . that you can become a Prayer Partner for Mission? Pick up a card from the table in the narthex, fill it out and leave it in the church office. The Southeastern District has a goal of 3,000 Prayer Partners for Mission. With more than 2,500 already signed up, the District would like to have the full number of 3,000 by its May 31-June 2 convention.

. . . that you could be a delegate to the 36th Regular Convention of the Southeastern District of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod? But you have to hurry. The last day to commit is February 5. The Convention is in Virginia Beach, Thursday, May 31-Saturday, June 2, in Virginia Beach. The congregation pays all convention-related expenses. See Pastor John.

. . . that the U.S. Supreme Court unanimously upheld the church's right to relate to its members, who are formally called into ministry, according to policies of the church and not by the rules of the civil courts? The decision has been described as the most significant 1st Amendment ruling in 50 years. The ruling was in favor of an LCMS school in Michigan.
